Did You Know?

Your library card opens up additional online resources called "databases". In this issue of Cover to Cover we're highlighting *NoveList*—a database designed especially for readers. Here are iust some of the NoveList features:

*Unique story elements: NoveList's unique story elements, like appeal, genre, and theme, help you understand what readers love about a book and help you find more that are your style.

*Read Alike Recommendations: Recommendations are crafted by experts, and let you know who wrote a recommendation and why the recommendation makes sense. They offer recommendations for titles, authors, and series, as well as audiobooks.

*Listen-alike recommendations for audiobooks: The same expertise NoveList librarians use to recommend print books is also applied to audiobooks, one of the fastest-growing types of reading.

*Series Information: A common challenge for readers, NoveList Plus has full series information.

In addition to NoveList, RPL also has access to NoveList K-8. It has all of the features of NoveList but is tailored for our smallest readers.

To access NoveList, go to rushvillelibrary.com and choose Databases>General Databases. NoveList and NoveList K-8 are at the top of the database list! Make sure you have your card number ready to access the site.

Are you a gardener who's wanting something different in your yard? Ready to ditch some of the turf? Or maybe incorporate more native plants into your landscape? Or just wondering how we went from wildscapes to lawns. Join the library and Rushville City Parks as we lead a 3 month book club discussing all these topics. Master naturalist and gardener, Kathi Jackley will begin the book discussion by giving us background on how we shape our environment and how our environment shapes us, how our understanding of nature affect our actions toward the environment and how our environmental history affects our landscape and us today. Each book will address these key points. Books selections include *Bringing* Nature Home, Nature's Best Hope and The Nature of Oaks (all by Doug Tallamy). The series draws on the need to incorporate more sustainable methods into yards and gardens, how to boost wildlife and insect populations, and what gives us the most "bang" for yard and gardens. In addition to the three titles mentioned above, book club members will receive a natural journal/notebook to track questions, thoughts, and observations to help aid in discussions. Indiana Library Passport App

The Indiana State Library is pleased to announce the launch of the Indiana Library Passport, a mobile passport that encourages everyone to visit libraries across the Hoosier state. The passport is a free program, open to everyone. It showcases over 60 main libraries and branches to explore including 31 historical Carnegie libraries-in an easy,

In addition to 31 historical Carnegie libraries, the passport includes stops at the Allen County Public Library, which features the new Rolland Center for Lincoln Research; the South Whitley Community Public Library, which features the Shultz Gem Collection; the Bartholomew County Public Library, which features architectural design by I.M. Pei and the Large Arch statue by Henry Moore; and RPL!

Patrons can visit https://passsport.library.in.gov/ where they can sign-up for the Indiana Library passport by providing their name, email address and mobile phone number. A link is then sent to their mobile phone, which opens the passport and directs the user to add the button icon to their home screen, where they can access it any time. Once Upon a Wardrobe by Patti Callahan

Megs Devonshire sets out to fulfill her younger brother George's last wish by uncovering the truth behind his favorite story. The answer provides hope an healing and a magical journey for anyone whose life has ever been changed by a book. 1950: Margaret Devonshire (Megs) is a 17-year-old student of mathematics and physics at Oxford University. When her beloved 8-year-old brother asks Megs is Narnia is real, logical Megs tells him it's just a book for children, and certainly not true. Homebound due to his illness, and remaining fixated on his favorite books, George presses her to ask the author of the recently released novel *The Lion, the Witch* and the Wardrobe a question: "Where did Narnia come from?" Despite her fear about approaching the famous author, who is a professor at her school. Megs soon finds herself taking tea with C.S. Lewis and his own brother Warnie, begging them for answers. Rather than directly telling her where Narnia came from, Lewis encourages Megs to form her own conclusion as he slowly tells her the little-known stories from his own life that led to his inspiration. As she takes these stories home to George, the little boy travels farther in in imagination than he ever could in real life. Lewis's answers will reveal to Megs and her family many truths that science and math cannot, and the gift she thought she was giving to her brother, the story behind Narnia, tourns out to be his gift to her.
